First Class Voyager

In this our maiden issue of Valley Wheel, our official weekly club bulletin for RY 2013, 2014, let me take through our itinerary for our one year journey together as your club president. Of hand, I'm not claiming myself as first class per se. We are, however, responding to a call from RI President Ron Burton to be the first class (RY 2013-2014 FC Team) or the first batch to implement the Future Vision Plan of the Rotary Foundation, effective July 1, 2013. As such, we initially gave some amount to TRF before the 2013 Lisbon RI Convention, even before we started our term. Which is why, our District Governor Louie Ticman gave us the First Class Team button during our District handover last Saturday, in much the same way that all the District Governors were given theirs by RI President Ron Burton then. So all of us belong to the first class team. And this is our voyage together, with all its highs and lows.

Our main focus during this year are in two areas, namely RI President's main advocacy of PolioPlus and our District Governor's environmental advocacy. In support of this final push to finally eradicate polio from the face of the earth, we must do our share by increasing awareness about the End Polio Now campaign and contributing to the PolioPlus fund. RI President Ron Burton also wants the First Class Team to finally end polio now or jumpstart its final end. At the district level, we are fully supporting our Environmentalist Governor Louie Ticmanby adopting some of his environmental projects. He wants us to handle the charcoal brisquet making project, which we plan to implement in Barangay Kayrupa, San Rafael, Rodriguez to give livelihood alternative to the kaingeros in the area and/or in a barangay or community in Marikina as well. We are also adopting the bamboo tree planting project along the banks of the Marikina River up to San Mateo and Rodriguez in Rizal as well as at the Marikina Watershed area as a zone 4 project. We are also partners with the City Government of Marikina and with Mayor and PP Del de Guzman in his advocacy to reforest the Marikina Watershed Land Protected area to prevent or minimize another disastrous flooding of the Marikina valley.

We will continue to support our literacy and health-related projects. I believe, however, that the city of Marikina, under the able leadership of Mayor Del, has been serving well our community of the basic needs of our school children as well as every Marikeños basic medical requirements.

I will report to you weekly what we have done or will do in our travels together. I just hope that you are all committed to this voyage. It's a one year voyage, which should rightfully detour somewhere below the equator, if you are willing to experience the 2014 Sydney RI Convention in June. So let us get all aboard the SS First Class Team and begin our journey together. Thank you.

What we call air pollution

(Continuation of last Valley Issue **ECOLOGY TODAY** June 26, 2013: Every Breath We Take – Air Quality)

Not all substances in the air are considered pollutants. In general, air pollution is defined as the existence of certain pollutants in the atmosphere at levels that adversely affect human health, the environment, and our cultural heritage (buildings, monuments and materials). In the context of legislation, only the pollution from man-made sources is considered, although pollution might be defined more broadly in other contexts.

Not all air pollutants come from man-made sources. Many natural phenomena, including volcanic eruptions, forest fires, and sand storms release air pollutants into the atmosphere. Dust particles can travel quite far depending on winds and clouds. Regardless of whether they are man-made or natural, once these substances are in the atmosphere, they can take part in chemical reactions and contribute to air pollution. Clear skies and high visibility are not necessarily signs of clean air.

Despite significant improvements in recent decades, air pollution in Europe continues to harm our health and the environment. In particular, pollution from particulate matter and pollution from ozone pose serious health risks to European citizens, affecting quality of life and reducing life expectancy. But different pollutants have different sources and impacts. It is worth taking a closer look at the main pollutants.

When tiny particles float in the air

Particulate matter (PM) is the air pollutant that causes the greatest harm to human health in Europe. Think of PM as particles so light that they can float in the air. Some of these particles are so small (one thirtieth to one fifth of the diameter of a human hair) that not only do they penetrate deep in our lungs, they also pass into our bloodstream, just like oxygen.

Some particles are emitted directly into the atmosphere. Others come about as a result of chemical reactions involving precursor gases, namely sulphur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, ammonia, and volatile organic compounds.

These particles can be composed of various chemical components, and their impact on our health and the environment depends on their composition. Some heavy metals, such as arsenic, cadmium, mercury and nickel, can also be found in particulate matter.

A recent study by the World Health Organization (WHO) shows that fine particle pollution (PM_{2.5} i.e. particulate matter no greater than 2.5 microns in diameter) might be a greater health concern than previously estimated.

According to the WHO's "Review of evidence on health aspects of air pollution", long-term exposure to fine particles can trigger atherosclerosis, adverse birth outcomes, and childhood respiratory diseases. The study also suggests a possible link with neurodevelopment, cognitive function and diabetes, and strengthens the causal link between PM_{2.5} and cardiovascular and respiratory deaths.

Depending on their chemical composition, particles can also affect global climate by either heating or cooling the planet. For example, black carbon, one of the common components of soot found mostly in fine particles (smaller than 2.5 microns in diameter), results from the incomplete combustion of fuels — both fossil fuels and wood burning. In urban areas, black carbon emissions are mostly caused by to road transport, diesel engines in particular. Besides its health impacts, black carbon in particulate matter contributes to climate change by absorbing the sun’s heat and warming the atmosphere.
