We had just undertaken another milestone in our Zone 4 history last July 6, 2013 at the Marikina Convention Center. All the fourteen (14) Rotary clubs in Marikina, San Mateo, and Rodriguez in Rizal had its 21st Joint Induction and Handover Ceremonies. This tradition was started during the term of our very own, PDG Ting Tanco in RY 1993-1994, when he encouraged all the five (5) clubs in Zone 4 to get together and have a joint induction. This first ever Zone 4 joint induction in June 1993 is witness to the transfer of leadership of the Rotary Club of Marikina from PP Manny de Guzman to PP Florinio de la Paz. The other four (4) clubs in Zone 4 include RC Marikina North, RC Marikina Central, RC Marikina West and RC Marikina Hilltop. From 5 clubs, we now have a total of fourteen (14) clubs in Zone 4, including our daughter clubs in San Mateo and Rodriguez and RC San Mateo Highlands in Rizal. Maybe in the not so distant future, when Zone 4 has extended more clubs as we are planning to do so this year, there will be a reorganization of the zone 4 club groupings.

With that Zone 4 Joint Induction, signals also the start of our zone 4 First Class Presidents journey together. As president of the mother club, RC Marikina, I was unanimously elected by my classmates to be their Chairman during our one year journey together as zone 4. I hope to provide the kind of leadership they expect from us and the best that I can with your help. We all belong to the first class team. And this is our voyage together, with all its highs and lows.

As a zone, we are all fully supportive of RI President Ron Burton's objective for the First Class Team to launch a final push to finally eradicate polio from the face of the earth. At the district level, we are adopting our Environmentalist Governor Louie Ticman's environmental flagship projects. We will implement the charcoal briquette making project to give livelihood alternative to the kaingeros in the Wawa Dam area and also in a barangay or community in Marikina as well. We are adopting the bamboo tree planting project along the banks of the Marikina River up to San Mateo and Rodriguez in Rizal as well as at the Marikina Watershed area as zone 4 projects. We will continue to support and launch several humanitarian service projects in the 6 areas of focus. As zone 4 projects, we have initially committed to mentoring our school children with reading disabilities. We will also provide our school children technology access to the world of literature through our e-book learning project.

Our club will enter into a MOA with our Mayor Del de Guzman and the City Government of Marikina to firm up and consolidate our partnership in support of the reforestation of the Marikina Watershed Land Protected area and other livelihood, community development, health and literacy projects.

This is the second entry in my journal of what has been happening the past week in our travels together. Thank you for getting on board and joining our expedition together. I just hope to get to our destination soon. But as always, ultimately, what's important is not really in getting to our target destination, but the experiences we get along the way in our travels together. Thank you.

FUTURE VISION PLAN

In anticipation of The Rotary Foundation's 100-year anniversary in 2017, the Trustees set out to develop a plan to move the Foundation toward its second century of service. The plan reflects the desires and interests of Rotarians worldwide to give the Foundation a more sustainable and visible impact in the world. The plan is simple and flexible, allowing Rotarians to apply for grants online. The Future Vision Plan is intended to

- Simplify Foundation programs and processes consistent with the mission
- Focus Rotarian service efforts where they will have the greatest impact by addressing priority world needs that are relevant to Rotarians
- Offer funding options to help achieve both global and local goals
- Increase the sense of ownership at the district and club levels by transferring more decisions to the districts and their member clubs
- Advance understanding of the Foundation's work and enhance Rotary's public image

To simplify the grant-making process, the Future Vision Plan offers only two types of grants: Rotary Foundation District Grants and Rotary Foundation Global Grants. Together, these grants will allow clubs and districts to carry out a broad spectrum of humanitarian and educational efforts, both locally and abroad.

District Grants

Rotary Foundation District Grants are block grants made to districts to support activities that fit within the Foundation's mission. Districts can use these grants to fund scholarships, support vocational teams, sponsor volunteer service, provide disaster recovery assistance, and carry out community and international service projects. District grants allow flexibility to Rotarians in carrying out grant activities and are fully funded through District Designated Funds.

Global Grants

Rotary Foundation Global Grants support larger projects with sustainable, high-impact outcomes within the six areas of:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

Clubs and districts can either create their own global grant projects or sponsor packaged grants developed by The Rotary Foundation in collaboration with strategic partners. Club- and district-

The OZONE

(Continuation of last Valley Issue **ECOLOGY TODAY**-
JULY 4, 2013: Every Breath We Take – Air Quality)

Ozone: when three atoms of oxygen bind together

Ozone is a special and highly reactive form of oxygen, consisting of three atoms of oxygen. In the stratosphere — one of the upper layers of the atmosphere — ozone protects us from the Sun's dangerous ultra-violet radiation. But in the lowest layer of the atmosphere — the troposphere — ozone is in fact an important pollutant affecting public health and nature.



Ground-level ozone is formed as a result of complex chemical reactions between precursor gases such as nitrogen oxides and non-methane volatile organic compounds. Methane and carbon monoxide also play a role in its formation.

Ozone is powerful and aggressive. High levels of ozone corrode materials, buildings and living tissue. It reduces plants' ability to conduct photosynthesis, and hinders their uptake of carbon dioxide. It also impairs plant reproduction and growth, resulting in lower crop yields and reduced forest growth. In the human body, it causes inflammation in the lungs and the bronchia.

Once exposed to ozone, our bodies try to prevent it from entering our lungs. This reflex reduces the amount of oxygen we inhale. Inhaling less oxygen makes our hearts work harder. So for people already suffering from cardiovascular diseases or respiratory diseases like asthma, high-ozone episodes can be debilitating and even fatal.

What else is in the mix?

Ozone and PM are not the only air pollutants of concern in Europe. Our cars, lorries, energy plants and other industrial facilities all need energy. Almost all vehicles and facilities use some form of fuel and burn it to obtain energy.

Fuel combustion usually changes the form of many substances, including nitrogen — the most abundant gas in our atmosphere. When nitrogen reacts with oxygen, nitrogen oxides form in the air (including nitrogen dioxide NO₂). When nitrogen reacts with hydrogen atoms, it creates ammonia (NH₃), which is another air pollutant with severe adverse effects on human health and nature.

In fact, combustion processes release a variety of other air pollutants, ranging from sulphur dioxide and benzene to carbon monoxide and heavy metals. Some of these pollutants have short-term effects on human health. Others, including some heavy metals and persistent organic

developed grants will receive a funding match from the Foundation. Packaged grants will be fully funded by the Foundation. The minimum total project cost for each global grant is US\$30,000.

Rotarians can develop a variety of global grant activities that may take the shape of a humanitarian project, a scholarship, a vocational training team, or any combination of these activities:

- Humanitarian projects supporting the goals of the areas of focus will produce measurable outcomes that will benefit the targeted community long after grant funds have been expended. In addition, the community, as well as the sponsoring clubs and districts, will be actively involved in all stages of the project.
- Scholarships will support international, graduate-level study for a term of one to four years. The scholar's academic and professional goals must further the goals of their selected area(s) of focus.
- Vocational training teams will either provide or receive training within the areas of focus. Team size and composition, as well as professional background, are variable; however, each participant's career goals must be linked to the area(s) of focus

pollutants, accumulate in the environment. This allows them to get into our food chain and ultimately end up on our plates.

Other pollutants, such as benzene, can damage cells' genetic material and cause cancer in the event of long-term exposure. As benzene is used as an additive to petrol, around 80 % of benzene released into the atmosphere in Europe comes from the combustion of fuels used by vehicles.

Another known cancer-causing pollutant, benzo(a)pyrene (BaP), is released mainly from the burning of wood or coal in residential stoves. Car exhaust fumes, especially from diesel vehicles, is another source of BaP. In addition to causing cancer, BaP can also irritate the eyes, nose, throat and bronchial tubes. BaP is usually found in fine particles.
