Mechanisms of response

Post disaster response has been typically at three (now four) levels.

w **Relief** immediately after the calamity, lasting from the first 24 hours to about two to three months and catering to immediate shelter, food, water and medical assistance.

w **Reconstruction** following relief and extending to a period of approximately two years, aimed at rebuilding the basic physical infrastructure and shelter to enable people to begin afresh; and,

w **Rehabilitation**, that looks at more long term inputs of reinstating lost livelihoods, introducing new economic opportunities and improving land and water management processes so as to reduce people's vulnerability and enhance capacities to handle future calamities.

w **Readiness**, a response which should ideally have been a proactive measure, is to enhance preparedness in identified vulnerable regions by introducing mechanisms and methods of construction that mitigate impacts of future disasters.

Rotary clubs take action for typhoon-ravaged Philippines

Rotary clubs around the world are pledging emergency aid to communities in central Philippines after last week's massive typhoon flattened entire coastal towns and villages, killed thousands of people, and displaced nearly 600,000 more.

The situation remains dire as widespread destruction has made food, water, and medicine scarce in remote areas affected by Typhoon Haiyan, the strongest storm to make landfall on record.

Rotary President Ron Burton is urging our 34,000 clubs worldwide to continue to assist storm victims.

"I know we all want to help. I am urging our clubs to take action to provide emergency aid now and begin planning for the future when we can help rebuild homes, schools, and businesses," says Burton. "We are in the business of helping people in need."

Rotary partner ShelterBox has committed aid for 4,000 families in the form of emergency shelter and other relief assistance.

Such disasters are "exactly why we entered into our partnership with ShelterBox," says Burton. "It gives Rotary members worldwide the opportunity to respond immediately and in a very meaningful way to the life-threatening conditions faced by the people of the Philippines."

For nearly 100 years, Rotary clubs in the Philippines have been creating positive change in their communities. The first Philippine Rotary club was formed in Manila in 1919. Today, more than 800 Rotary clubs throughout the Philippines give members the chance to make a difference at home and around the globe.

Rotary's work to eradicate polio, our top priority, began in the Philippines. In 1979, Rotary funded the immunization of six million children with the oral polio vaccine. Based largely on the success there, the World Health Assembly authorized the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in which Rotary is a spearheading partner.

Rotary clubs in the Philippines have improved water and sanitation, led medical and dental missions, created literacy programs, and participated in reforestation plantings. When a 7.1 magnitude earthquake struck central Philippines in September, clubs were there to bring aid to those in need.

"Rotary members often are both first-responders and rebuilders when major disasters strike because clubs are present in every corner of the world," Burton says. "We continue with recovery efforts long after international relief agencies have gone because Rotary clubs are part of the communities we serve."

Clubs in Rotary District 3860, which covers the area that sustained the most damage, created a relief fund for victims. [Learn more.](#)

Rotary Club of Marikina COMELEC Guidelines for Election of Officers & Directors for RY 2014-2015



Qualification of Candidates

1. He must be a member of the club in good standing.
2. He must have paid all his dues and all other assessments (including Inductions, Anniversaries and Christmas Parties) to the club as of date of election.
3. He must have attended 50% of the regular meeting out of which 50% must be in the home club and provided he has not incurred four (4) consecutive absences.

Voter's Eligibility

1. Only members in good standing as of election date shall be entitled to vote. Members who have paid all his dues and all other assessments (including inductions, Anniversaries and Christmas Parties) are considered members in good standing and will be allowed to vote.
2. Absent members are not allowed to vote (No proxy voting)

Election Process

1. The annual election shall be held during our club meeting on December 5, 2013
2. Nomination of Officers and Directors shall be presented by the members from the floor during the said meeting or in written form before the election day for all elective positions duly accepted in writing by the nominee.
3. Floor nomination of qualified members to absentia is allowed provided that there is a written acceptance for his nomination that will be submitted to the COMELEC during the election.
4. The position to be voted for are the following: PRESIDENT-NOMINEE, VICE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY, TREASURER AND FIVE (5) DIRECTORS.
5. Members nominated on the floor in any particular position must express personally his acceptance of the nomination before he is considered a candidate.
6. A roll call of members will be done after the closing of nomination for a particular position.
7. Methods of voting in electing the Officers and Directors shall be by SECRET BALLOTING and will be done one (1) minute after finishing the roll call.
8. A candidate who has been voted upon by the majority of the votes cast shall be declared winner in their respective positions.
9. A tie will be broken by a second balloting. If there is another tie on the second balloting, it will be broken by toss coin. One candidate chooses if he will go for head or tail and the other candidates will toss the coin to the floor.
10. In case of second balloting, only voters in the first balloting will be allowed to cast their votes in the second balloting to break the tie; latecomers will not be allowed to vote. Although late comers can still vote in the next position to be voted upon.
11. DECISION OF THE COMELEC IS FINAL unless appealed to the club members whose decision shall be final when reversed or modified by TWO-THIRDS votes of the members within a reasonable period of time as determined by the Board of Directors.
12. Should there be more than one candidate for president- nominee, the COMELEC shall hold a candidates' hour where each candidate will be Required to answer questions of general interest sifted by & selected /Rephrased by the commissioners from among those submitted by the members

After Natural Disaster, Reconstruction and Rehabilitation:

A response strategy for creation of sustainable livelihoods

(Part 1) November 28

Natural disasters, wars and development projects all lead to large scale impacts on life, property, infrastructure, and social and cultural relationships.

Disasters and their adverse impacts set societies back by decades and leave them vulnerable to physical, social and economic hardships. This may inhibit large sections of the affected society to come back even to the base level let alone develop at par with the rest of the nation.

This article takes lessons from previous and ongoing reconstruction and rehabilitation programs. It puts forward a post disaster response strategy to rebuild lives and livelihoods in a manner that paves a way for long term sustainable development.

In both manmade and natural disaster situations the impacts can be mitigated to a large extent through adequate planning and preparedness. Negative impacts of manmade disasters can be managed, if social, ecological and economic consequences of our actions are considered and development decisions made accordingly. On the other hand, while we can be adequately prepared for a natural disaster, we cannot totally eliminate its impacts.

The Problem Tree - root causes and long term consequences

In order to design a response strategy that addresses sustainability issues, it is important to understand the systemic causes and the long-term consequences of a catastrophic disaster. A problem tree to this affect was constructed by Marcus Oxley of CARE Australia; an expert in disaster emergency and relief operations.

Unsafe building practices that result in large scale damage are, in fact, a resultant of a fatal combination of lack of know-how about safe building practices, lack of technological options for safer building and a fatalistic attitude regarding the possibility of a disaster. These are often coupled with misplaced priorities that lead to more money spent on facades and embellishments in houses than on safe construction practices in economically better off households; and reinforced by poverty that prioritizes the daily meal over a safe shelter. These anomalies are at the root of why disasters take such a heavy toll as in Orissa in 1999 or Gujarat this year. A catastrophe such as the super cyclone or a major earthquake, pulls (especially) the poor down into its vortex.

The consequences are, of-course the most obvious and immediate, loss of life, property and infrastructure. The more long term and difficult outcome increased vulnerability to elements, loss of livelihoods, increased poverty, economic recession, malnutrition, leading to out-migration from villages, enhanced social disparities and strife.
