Last week, during our weekly meeting, we witnessed the turnover and donations of Shelter Boxes and Toilet bowls. Six shelter boxes worth US\$ 1,000 each were donated by our sister club RC Fukushima through the efforts of PP Fabi Cadiz. These were delivered to the beneficiaries and victims of Super Typhoon Yolanda in Samar by volunteers led by Dir. Val Barcinal last Friday. This is in cooperation with the DepEd Marikina.

We unveiled and had photos taken in several Shell Gas Stations in Marikina, San Mateo and Rodriguez, owned by PD Rey Montoya and Sps Lyn. The motorcade started at MRYC parking at 1:30PM then proceeded to the different billboards in Marikina and San Mateo. My president classmates in Zone 4 attended with some members. Rotarians from our club also joined us, including PP Dante Verano, PP Onnie Aguinaldo, VP Bernard Cansana, Dir. Manny Pecho and Rtn Tops Rodriguez. I am grateful to Rtn Roman Villame for his assistance in installing all the tarpaulins, including repairing and fabricating the aluminium frames for the billboards. Reconstruction and rehabilitation need to be in a seamless continuum with restoration efforts.

The issue of correct timing and speed is however, significant. A holistic approach does not negate the need for a fast response to immediate reconstruction.

Time and again it has been seen that people will revert back to their earlier unsustainable practices very soon if timely inputs are not made and systems that ensure long term continuity of material and skill availability are not set in place.

In Gujarat, many rural families are re-building in exactly the same manner as earlier. They are not prepared to wait for countless consultants to complete their assessment and project reports. In Latur, analysis of the post earthquake reconstruction, 7 years later, reveals that in many cases house extensions and new constructions are being done in unsafe manner as neither materials nor skills of improved construction technologies are available.

Rotary Club of Marikina COMELEC Guidelines for Election of Officers & Directors for RY 2014-2015



Qualification of Candidates

1. He must be a member of the club in good standing.
2. He must have paid all his dues and all other assessments (including Inductions, Anniversaries and Christmas Parties) to the club as of date of election.
3. He must have attended 50% of the regular meeting out of which 50% must be in the home club and provided he has not incurred four (4) consecutive absences.

Voter's Eligibility

1. Only members in good standing as of election date shall be entitled to vote. Members who have paid all his dues and all other assessments (including inductions, Anniversaries and Christmas Parties) are considered members in good standing and will be allowed to vote.
2. Absent members are not allowed to vote (No proxy voting)

Election Process

1. The annual election shall be held during our club meeting on December 5, 2013
2. Nomination of Officers and Directors shall be presented by the members from the floor during the said meeting or in written form before the election day for all elective positions duly accepted in writing by the nominee.
3. Floor nomination of qualified members to absentia is allowed provided that there is a written acceptance for his nomination that will be submitted to the COMELEC during the election.
4. The position to be voted for are the following: PRESIDENT-NOMINEE, VICE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY, TREASURER AND FIVE (5) DIRECTORS.
5. Members nominated on the floor in any particular position must express personally his acceptance of the nomination before he is considered a candidate.
6. A roll call of members will be done after the closing of nomination for a particular position.
7. Methods of voting in electing the Officers and Directors shall be by SECRET BALLOTING and will be done one (1) minute after finishing the roll call.
8. A candidate who has been voted upon by the majority of the votes cast shall be declared winner in their respective positions.
9. A tie will be broken by a second balloting. If there is another tie on the second balloting, it will be broken by toss coin. One candidate chooses if he will go for head or tail and the other candidates will toss the coin to the floor.
10. In case of second balloting, only voters in the first balloting will be allowed to cast their votes in the second balloting to break the tie; latecomers will not be allowed to vote. Although late comers can still vote in the next position to be voted upon.
11. DECISION OF THE COMELEC IS FINAL unless appealed to the club members whose decision shall be final when reversed or modified by TWO-THIRDS votes of the members within a reasonable period of time as determined by the Board of Directors.
12. Should there be more than one candidate for president- nominee, the COMELEC shall hold a candidates' hour where each candidate will be Required to answer questions of general interest sifted by & selected /Rephrased by the commissioners from among those submitted by the members

How to Copy Files between your Mobile and PC

What if you need to copy files and folders between your mobile device and PC? You can do so by connecting your mobile device to your PC using a USB cable provided. Better still, you can connect them wirelessly via a local WiFi network to do the same or even more without needing a cable.



1. Run the Play Store app.
2. Tap the Search button and enter the name of a remote desktop app, such as [AirDroid](#) (reviewed [here](#)).
3. Tap the app from the list and download it.
4. Open the app and start using it to connect your mobile to PC for copying files wirelessly and doing even more between the two platforms.

How to Share Mobile Data Connection

When you're using an Android device with mobile data connection enabled, wouldn't it be convenient for another computer device such as a Windows-based notebook to share this connection for access to the Internet? Yes, you can do a wireless connection via a portable hotspot, or a wired connection using a USB cable:

Turn your Android mobile into a portable Wi-Fi hotspot:

1. On your mobile, go to Settings > More > Tethering & portable hotspot.
2. Tap "Portable Wi-Fi hotspot" to enable it.
3. Tap "Configure Wi-Fi hotspot" to enter an ID and password to prevent unauthorized connections.
4. On a computer with Wi-Fi connectivity, click the network icon on the system tray to identify and connect to the wireless network you set.

Reconstruction and Rehabilitation:

A response strategy for creation of sustainable livelihoods

(Part2)

Disaster – an opportunity

Let us look at a disaster situation not as a glass half empty but half full. Not as a tremendous loss but as an opportunity now being offered "again". An opportunity to begin the process of development in a more sustainable mode. An opportunity to set in place systems, technologies and processes that improve the quality of life and are in sync with the regional geo-environmental conditions.

It is possible to do so at such a time and at a large enough scale not only because one has virtually a new canvas to begin with, but also because people's mind-sets about conventional (as practiced) systems of construction (and other development paradigms) are altered in one stroke. In Gujarat, (whole) communities who would be extremely conservative about any change in their building practices, are now questioning the way they and their fathers have been building and are seeking "improved" systems. They now understand the limitations of earlier systems and are clearly amenable to change.

A Holistic Approach

The process of reconstruction involves partial or complete relocation and rebuilding the essential physical infrastructure and shelter (house) so that vulnerability levels are reduced and families are able to get back to their feet. Reconstruction therefore paves the way for long term rehabilitation.

Rehabilitation primarily addresses the new or increased poverty levels that have emerged due to the disaster. Jobs and income generation measures in the construction sector provide an immediate and emergency boost to the local economy. This is followed by long term improvement in land and water management and economic opportunities that seek to upgrade local economies and reduce community vulnerability in a sustainable manner.

For the process of sustainable development to take off in continuation with reconstruction, it is important that the end objective is not limited to only getting people back upto the base line levels prior to the quake or cyclone. The intervention over a longer term should resultant improved quality of life and reduced levels of vulnerability. While families are tuned to picking up the pieces of their life, concepts of improved building practices, sanitation, sewerage, rainwater harvesting, improved land and water management etc. can be gradually introduced.

It is reported in Orissa, (The Role of Enabling Infrastructure: A Case Study of Housing Interventions in Orissa by N Ashok Kumar et al) that in Adivasi villages, where development activities of improved shelter, land and water management and livelihoods were in progress at the time of the super cyclone, not only was the loss of property and life minimal, the loss in economic time was only to the tune of 5 to 10 days. People could bounce back to their normal routines very soon after the cyclone. While in adjacent villages, months after the cyclone, families were still unable to get back to regular work leading to longer term economic decline. This is a very strong argument in favour of "total rehabilitation" as opposed to only reconstruction.

5. Remember that the club members expect you in the meetings as you expect them to be there. Do unto others as you would others do unto you. (Applicable kaya dito ang Golden Rule?)
6. Remember that the joy of living is in living with joy. Share your joy with your co-Rotarians in Rotary meetings. It does not pay to be a recluse and get involved in some legal entanglement with your biography. (Parang may kahawig sa stateside case ito?)
7. Remember that membership with Rotary last longer when you regularly attend its meetings. By attending Rotary meetings, you can last longer in Rotary. (Ay mali!)

If you still don't remember your Rotary meetings despite these easy pointers, you better get in touch with your club treasurer right away. It's about time you paid your dues.
