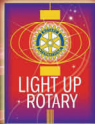

Once again Marikina City was under a state of calamity last September 19, 2014 when Typhoon Mario past thru the east side of Luzon. Many areas in Marikina were flooded and there were houses submerge 2ft and above. Many Marikenos were stranded and were rescued from their houses especially from the barangays of Malanday, Nangka, and Tumana. Several Rotarians of RC Marikina were also affected by the flooding. However, That did not stop us, RC Marikina, from responding to serve above ourselves and do good to our community. Immediately, several of our Rotarians who were not affected by the flooding went to MRYC to organize a relief operation. We coordinated with the Marikina City Disaster and Risk Reduction Management Office headed by their Chief and our Secretary Val Barcinal. We prepared hot meals (Lugaw) to be given to the evacuees as well as to the rescue volunteers. The cooperation and coordination of RC Marikina with our partners in service were shown at its fullness. We were closely working with the Marikina Red Cross Chapter, MCDRRMO and the Marivalley Constructors Association with the Philippine Constructors Association (National). The Red Cross Marikina provided the rescue volunteers and helped us in distributing the food meals that we prepared to the evacuation centers. The Marivalley and PCA National provided the trucks that brought the stranded people to the evacuation centers and also pick up the relief goods from DSWD NAIA warehouse to Marikina. The plan of actions and Instructions all came from the command center of the MCDRRMO. MRYC became a distribution depot of relief goods by several groups and concerned people.

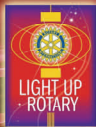

The village of Kumbharwadi is one of many in a drought-prone region near Mumbai, India. Until recently, its residents had access to only one well with drinkable water. During the summer months, the well runs dry, and the women and girls of the village travel three to four hours a day to search for water.

Enter Project Boond, undertaken by a Rotaract club, a Rotary club, and the Watershed Organization Trust to provide clean drinking water and sanitation facilities in

Kumbharwadi. Nikunj Pherwani, 2013-14 president of the Rotaract Club of Hassaram Rihumal College of Commerce and Economics in Mumbai, India, says that droughts are a serious problem in India and often exacerbate malnutrition and illness in remote regions.

"Our major aim through this project was to provide clean water for drinking and domestic purposes to the drought-affected areas of Maharashtra," he says. "These villages not only suffer due to shortage of water but also due to several waterborne diseases."

Pherwani's Rotaract club teamed up with the Rotary Club of Bombay, Maharashtra, India, to raise funds for the project through donations and events, including a comedic play and black tie dinner. The project has over \$13,000 in its coffers, and the clubs are using the funds to dig wells and install toilets.

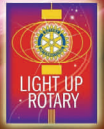
Pherwani's club also worked with the Rotary Club of Bombay to choose a local nonprofit organization to partner with. They found the Watershed Organization Trust, a nonprofit dedicated to ending water scarcity and poverty in rural India. After meeting with officials and signing an MOU, the Watershed Organization Trust helped them choose a village, and the Rotaractors traveled there to speak to locals about the credibility of their partners. Pherwani says they continue to visit Kumbharwadi every two months to check in with the village and see if additional resources are needed. Village leaders have been trained to maintain the new facilities.

In addition to providing clean water and sanitation facilities, Pherwani says they also aim to provide villagers with chlorine tablets and a workshop on basic health and hygiene.

Among the seven Rotaract projects that were honored at this year's Rotaract Preconvention, Project Boond was chosen as the international winner of the Recognition of Outstanding Rotaract Project. Two members of the Rotaract Club of Hassaram Rihumal College of Commerce and Economics attended the preconvention on 30 May in Sydney, Australia. They traveled there using miles that Rotary won through United Airlines' 10 Million Charity Miles giveaway. They, along with representatives from other winning clubs, presented their projects and received their awards.

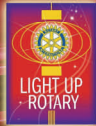

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE

Rotary Youth Exchange is Rotary's exchange program for youth and young adults. It allows students to spend up to a year living in a different country and learning a new culture. Students ages 15-19 can participate in a long-term exchange of up to one year, or they can choose a short-term exchange, which can last from several days to several weeks. New Generations Exchanges for young adults ages 18-25 can range from a few weeks to three months. Rotary clubs and districts sponsor exchange participants, who serve as ambassadors for their countries.

Your Rotary club can support Rotary Youth Exchange by

- Inviting an exchange student to give a presentation at a club meeting
- Coordinating with another club to host or sponsor a student
- Promoting the cultural and educational benefits of Youth Exchange to potential students and host families
- Arranging for a former or current Youth Exchange student to address the local parent-teacher association or a school assembly to personally recommend the program
- Contacting your district Youth Exchange chair or district governor for more information on getting involved

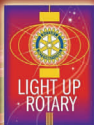
ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards is Rotary's leadership training program for young people. RYLA participants range from age 14 to 30, so most clubs and districts choose to focus on a specific age group, such as 14-18, 19-24, or 25-30. RYLA emphasizes leadership, citizenship, and personal growth. The program demonstrates Rotary's respect and concern for youth by providing an effective training experience for potential leaders, encouraging leadership of youth by youth, and publicly recognizing young people who serve their communities.

Your Rotary club can support RYLA by

- Asking school administrators and Interact club advisers to promote RYLA
- Inviting former RYLA participants to speak about their experience at a club meeting
- Budgeting to send local participants to the district RYLA event
- Recruiting young people with leadership potential in the community to attend a district RYLA
- Organizing RYLA reunions or follow-up events
- Contacting your district RYLA chair to find out how your club can participate

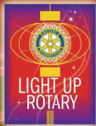

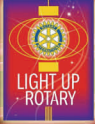

Image Enhancement Settings



Not all cameras have image enhancement settings, but it's become more common in DSLRs and nicer compact cameras in recent years. The ones you want to pay the

most attention to are lighting correction and noise reduction. Lighting (and tone) correction, which is referred to as D-lighting on Nikon cameras and Auto Lighting Optimizer and Highlight Tone Priority (the modes are split into two) on Canon, will try to retain more detail from under- and over-exposed parts of your photographs while improving color as well. Noise reduction does what you'd expect—it reduces noise. It also reduces detail. Lighting correction tends to increase noise. Basically, these modes are nice but they have their drawbacks. Often times you can set how aggressively they alter your photos. Low settings are recommended.

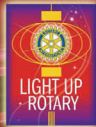
Video Mode



We're dealing with photography, so we're not going to talk much about video mode. It's also handled very differently by different cameras as there isn't currently much of a standard. Additionally, video mode varies significantly between the different types of cameras. Point-and-shoots can often automatically focus very quickly in video mode and act a lot like a dedicated video camera.

Compact mirror-less cameras with interchangeable lenses tend to provide a higher quality video but automatically focus a bit slower and are not terribly easy to focus manually. DSLR cameras generally produce the highest quality video, automatically focus extremely poorly (if they do at all), but provide excellent control over manual focus. If you're recording video with a DSLR, you'll want to become comfortable with manually focusing your lenses.

When you record video on any camera, it's generally saved in the same folder as your photos on your flash card, but some cameras have a dedicated folder for video. If the file was saved as an AVI, MOV, or MP4, you should be able to just copy it off your camera and play it back. All of these formats also work fine for uploading to video sharing sites like YouTube or Vimeo. Other formats may be video streams which generally require conversion to be useful, so consult your camera's manual if you don't recognize the file type.

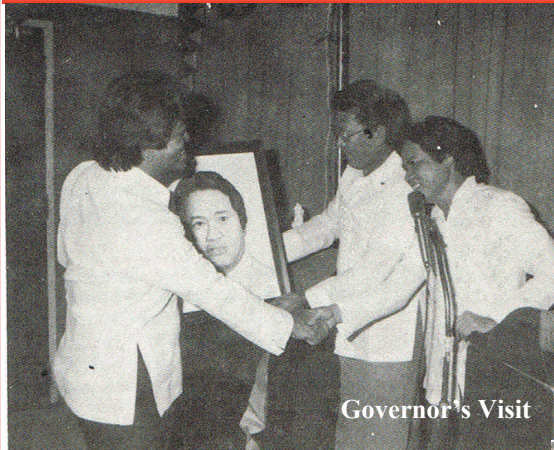

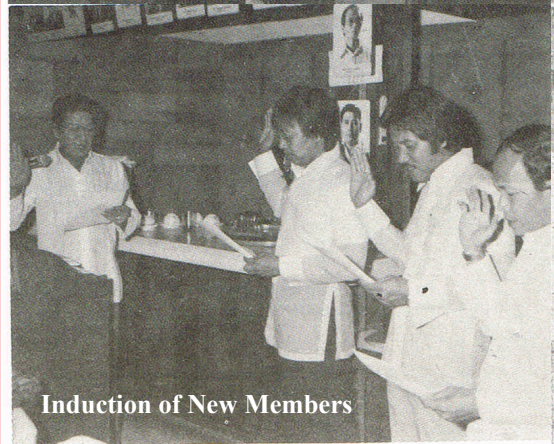

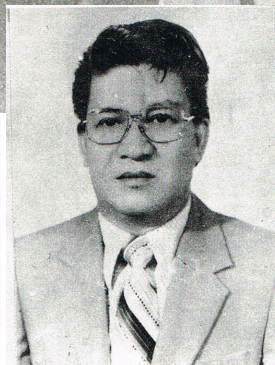

NEW GENERATIONS ALUMNI

Rotarians can support New Generations by finding and engaging alumni. Although former Interactors, Rotaractors, Youth Exchange students, and RYLA participants may no longer live in your district, many alumni from other countries and districts probably do.

All youth program alumni deserve the opportunity to stay involved with Rotary. Your Rotary club can reach out to alumni by

- Planning graduation events for school-based Interact and Rotaract clubs to recognize those leaving the program, and identifying opportunities for their continued involvement in Rotary
- Introducing former youth program participants who are relocating to another area to Rotary clubs in their new communities
- Contacting alumni from your district who have already moved out of your area, and helping them get in touch with Rotary clubs where they now live
- Placing advertisements in local newspapers or using social networking sites to encourage former youth program participants to reconnect to Rotary through your club
- Inviting alumni to visit your club and attend club and district events

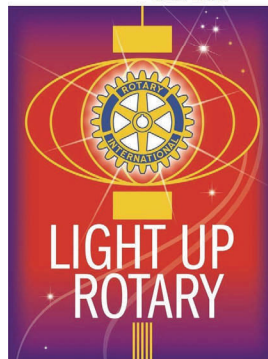
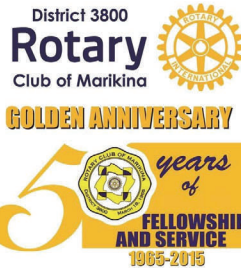
